We, the undersigned, are the executive director of Fix the Court, the President of the Dallas-Fort Worth Association of Black Journalists, the executive director of the Radio Television Digital News Association, and the executive director Reporters Committee for the Freedom of the Press respectively.

We write today to urge the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit to livestream the audio of 17-70008, *Charles Thompson v. Lorie Davis*, to be argued at 11:00 a.m. on October 21, 2019.

We are greatly appreciative of the Fifth Circuit's same-day audio policy but believe that the public's significant interest in the issues of capital punishment presented in this case, as well as the importance of transparency and public access, merit live audio here. We hope the Fifth Circuit joins other Circuits in providing live-audio access for cases of national import.
